# The Program

Students entering their Junior or Senior year in September 2014, as well as June graduates, may enroll in courses.

Students can enroll in course(s) offered in any high school, regardless of the student's home school district.

# Course Design

Summer courses will be offered in either a traditional (T) or hybrid (H) format. Hybrid classes have fewer classroom sessions with activities done on-line using the College's Blackboard platform.

## Cost

The cost for a 3 credit class is \$170 (1/3 of the normal part-time rate). (Textbook costs are not included)

# Registration

## A. Eligibility Requirements

- 1. Students must be enrolled in a Regents Program
- 2. Student must have an average of 80 or higher in the subject area
- 3. If no course history in that area, an average of 80 or higher in English is required

## B. Procedure

- 1. Obtain Early Admit form from Guidance Office
- 2. Complete form including parent/guardian signature
- 3. Return completed form to Guidance Office
- 4. Guidance Office submits form with final transcript to C-GCC for approval

## \*EN 101 and EN 102 prerequisites

The summer session is a short intensive semester and is scheduled in a six week time frame. The Fall and Spring classes that are offered on campus are scheduled over a 15 week semester and college courses offered in the high schools are generally offered over 18-20 week period. It is critical that all students attend all class sessions. Missing one class is the same as missing more than an entire week of work. Unlike high schools, make-up time for absences is not an option. Students are responsible for all required work whether they are absent or not.

During the first week of classes each high school will have someone available to direct students to their assigned classrooms
